
IASWG Financial Dashboard (2017-2020)

Our income derives from seven major categories, fourteen including subcategories. Our year-end income for 2020 is projected to be \$77,330




Expenses

Our expenses fall into twelve larger categories, comprising of 33 subcategories. Our year-end expenses totaled \$44,232.



Total Income vs. Expenses Over Time




Margin of Operating Income vs. Expenses Over Time




How many IASWG Symposia have you attended?




32% of survey respondents were first-time attendees. What does this data show us? Does it provide insight on retention?

The virtual event was very inexpensive and could have charged more for the excellent sessions and speakers.


Language Interpretation

Connecting with people who are very genuine and kind; opportunities to learn about new things

I really enjoyed all of the sessions. Everyone was so well prepared and the hosts in the session were very helpful.

It was great to hear from social workers all around the world sharing their ideas and experiences in the work.

How can we improve the symposium next year?

For those of us living in the time zone furthest from New York is would be helpful to offer a few sessions at night. The early morning presentations happened in late evening here which made it difficult to view more than a few live sessions. Without too much stress it might have been possible to record a couple of talks later in the evening.

Even if it is in person, make some of the sessions virtual so that people around the world can continue to participate. It also makes it somewhat more affordable.

Consider allowing more time between sessions. I found that going from one session to the next didn't allow for much of a break in-between sessions.

You might consider posting a trailer of sorts (video briefing of what the sessions will cover) to advertise the session content, highlights, and objectives.

Sessions on contemporary issues like anti-racism and group work. Additional times/break out rooms for attendee connections and chats.

Simplify website and provide information on presentations and presenters earlier.

I really enjoyed the sessions that were interactive and allowed me to have 'hands on' experience as a group member. So, maybe more of these type offerings.

Virtual was great but I really noticed the difference not having face to face contact during and after presentations - those chats we have in hallways and over coffee/dinner.

The different time zones are a problem, but I realize that there is not much one can do about it. I preferred to listen to one or two presenters during a session. More than three presenters at a time made it difficult to follow. Fewer sessions to choose from.

This was excellent, although I missed seeing people in person.

Include service users in the program and feedback on how groups have impacted their learning and growth.

I was glad to see the effort to record sessions and have them available so that missing one to see another still allows one to participate. I would like to see that continue.

If the symposium is online again, I would recommend leaving more time for breaks. I often had to choose between attending a session and giving my eyes a break from the screen. Also, it might have been nice to have open rooms available for socializing or continued conversation.

I came to the symposium because it offered high value information at a low cost because it was virtual, if it could be low cost and virtual next year I will attend again.

It allows people who cannot afford to travel to attend. We should also look at different rates for attending the symposium to make the symposium more inclusive.

Needs better mods, especially in relation to management of questions

Given that sessions were run in parallel, I would have liked to have known well in advance which sessions were being recorded and which were not! When I went back to listen to sessions I was interested in but that when I went back, 3-5 were listed as not being recorded. If I had known in advance, i could have made arrangements with work to have that time off

If presentations will be virtual, tech support should be available for those who need the assistance.

Keep on working on internationalization

Perhaps more social time

Selecting only one workshop to attend during each time period was challenging! Perhaps offering a fewer number of workshops for each time period would help, if that is even possible.

Longer session times-- there was still so much information that I feel I could received if the sessions were longer.

What other events or trainings would you like IASWG to offer in the future?

More sessions with recent bachelors graduates

Anti-racist training

Training in queer-affirming group practice

Mentoring would be great, or support sessions for those of us who are just getting started in group work to be supported by a more seasoned practitioner.

More online programs

Include Groupwork activities for engaging children.

More information on best practices for Group Work utilizing Social Mediums.....Managing groups via Skype, Zoom, Web-ex, etc.....

Opportunities/sessions on how to influence CSWE's emphasis on group work education.

Dismantling racism around the world

More chapter events.

More on feminist and Igbtq perspectives and groups.

Maybe another session on teaching of online group work classes as folks may have some additional best practices after a full year in the online saddle.

I would like to explore how to make the work of the symposium and the chapter offerings become a stock of training and development for group workers around the world.

Whatever's current while incorporating our core knowledge. We must hold on to what we know. No other profession has our knowledge and practice skills.

It would be nice to offer more specific certifications for group work skills.

My organization relies heavily on volunteers, as I imagine a lot of the work represented at the symposium also does. I'd love to see more sessions on developing volunteers, weather framed as a social worker equipping a participant to carry the change into their community or more to my case developing volunteers as part of the mission delivery Lessons learned from this current climate (i.e. pandemic, racial disparity) impact on our work.

IASWG covered a broad spectrum of group work, however as indicated before it can provide training with working with individuals apart from the group experience.

More help with developing chapters.
